You failed to insert your byline. Don't rely on your editor to remember to insert it. Your editor may even think you don't want your name on the article. Being paid your fee is important. But also extremely important to your career is having your name on your published article. It enhances your reputation, and it gives you cuttings that you can photocopy and send to various editors to prove you are a published writer.

ALWAYS insert your byline immediately after your heading.

- Type a 15-word headline.
- Also, don't forget to put the name of the ONE publication your article is for.
- Put the EXACT word-count at the top.
